Course	ARQ 9113 - SPECIAL TOPICS I (3 credits) CRITICAL STUDIES OF BRAZILIAN ARCHITECTURE
Course Description	Native architecture in Brazil and in its neighboring countries. The advent of Portuguese and Spanish colonizers in Latin America. The influx of Portuguese building technology. The effects of African slavery. The French missionaries. The contributions of German and Italian immigration. Technical transformations: industrialization and the demand for artisanal continuity. Lucio Costa and critical regionalism. The triumph of ferroconcrete and its role in Brazilian architecture on the hands of Oscar Niemeyer, Affonso Reidy, among many others. The rise of Brasilia and the development of political architectural expressions. Tension between ethical concerns and aesthetics: Artigas, Mendes da Rocha, Lina Bo Bardi and the School of São Paulo. Analogies between Art and Architecture in Brazil. Architecture and landscape: Burle-Marx's legacy. Social Architectural dilemma: the swamps and the lack of mass-housing.

Course	ADM 2467 – Tópicos Especiais de Estratégia: Strategy and Innovation
Course Description	Central concepts and types of innovation. Innovation process and technological catch-up: differences between developed and emerging countries. Open innovation. Factors influencing innovation, dynamic capabilities and absorptive capacity. The role of markets and clients. Organizational innovation and business model innovation. The role of innovation in sustainability and economic development.
Course	ADM 2670 - Tópicos Especiais: Empirical Corporate Finance and Governance
Course Description	Empirical methods for causal inference research in corporate finance and governance: randomized trials, regression and instrumental variables, fixed effects and panel data, differences-in-differences, regression discontinuity design. Topics of corporate capital structure, dividend policy, financial restrictions and cash flow sensitivities. Topics of agency theory, corporate governance mechanisms, and investor protection.

Course Description	The aim of this International Business Course is to provide students with understanding of the international growth and development processes of firms. For that purpose, the course draws on theories in the fields of International Business (IB), comprising the process of internationalization and the impact of internationalization on the performance of companies. It also aims to integrate theory and practice, through case studies and class activities. The focus of this seminar will be to analyze the international issues facing the companies arounf the world, and develop a set of management skills to be applied in the global context.

Course	ADM 9984 – CASES IN INTERNATIONAL MARKETING
Course Description	Concepts and theories in international marketing. The challenges and opportunities in international markets. Environment analysis of international markets. Strategies to enter international markets. Choosing target markets and positioning. International marketing mix (product, price, distribution and marketing communication).
Course	ADM 1980 – TÓPICOS ESPECIAIS EM ADMINISTRAÇÃO I (EM INGLÊS - LEADERSHIP)
Course Description	Introduction to the study of leadership through theoretical and empirical research in the international literature in the social sciences. Emphasis on advancing the understanding of leadership through a focus on the rich complexities of human behavior and social interactions. Focus on leadership theory and research within and across formal organizational settings.

Course	COM 9033 – Brazilian Culture (4 credits)
Course Description	Culture and communications media. The course will develop a broad discussion or Brazilian culture, using documentaries produced and directed by Professor Luís Nachbir in remote parts of the country as a base for debate. These audiovisual pieces will show characters and local cultures that rarely appear in the media, revealing parts of ar unknown Brazil. OBJETIVOS: The aim is to provide opportunities for students in general to get in touch with some important aspects of Brazilian culture through an audiovisual perspective Discussions in class will be illustrated by documentaries and feature films that also highlight aspects that are not usually shown by the main media. The immensity of the country and cultural diversity amongst its regions — North Northeast, Central-West, Southeast and South — will be in the center of this course. Loca characters that appear in non-fiction films will generate anthropological reflections abou Brazilian contemporary social phenomena. As part of the learning process, students will be asked to develop simple audiovisual projects in which they will familiarize themselves with aspects of the country's culture and also develop basic abilities to approach a subject with a camera device. The field assignment consists of two parts: (1) data collection in a social context of their choice [two fieldwork visits], which will include observing, taking notes and conducting at least one on-site interview; (2) filming/interviewing on camera the chosen character(s) and the ambience around them [two fieldwork visits]. Archive footage might also be used in the final montage process.

The Economic History of Brazil will cover various economic events since colonial times, from the emergence of a sugar cane industry in the 16th century and the Atlantic slave trade, the role of Brazilian coffee plantations and the international economy during Imperial Brazil (1822-1889) and the Old Republic (1889-1930) and main economic events in modern Brazilian economy.

Course	HIS 9827 – Brazilian History (<i>4 credits</i>)
Course Description	South America in the context of the Portuguese ultramarine Empire. Black and Indian slavery. The Catholic Church: hierarchies and social identity in the colony. Political emancipation and the construction of the Imperial State. Nationality formation and social tensions. Crisis of slavery and the end of the monarchic regime. The historical experience of the Brazilian Republic. Authoritarianism and Democracy. Inclusion and exclusion in the Brazilian society.

Course Description	Basic concepts. Systemic approach. The construction of an administrative theory, focused on maximum productivity. Managerial roles. Quality management in USA and the Toyota model. Humanistic and behavioral approach. Stiles of administration. Sociotechnical approach and semiautonomous work groups. Participative management, results oriented management. Management in the third millennium.

► INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS

Course	IRI 9842 (Turma 24A) INTERNATIONAL AREA STUDIES II (Democracy and Human Rights in Latin America)
Course Description	This course examines the development as well as the challenges to democracy and human rights in Latin America. First, we discuss the theoretical frameworks for understanding democracy and human rights. Then we review the experience of Latin American countries with authoritarian regimes and human rights abuses during the period of what is called 'state terror' during the 1970s and 1980s. The last part of the class discusses current challenges to political and civil rights, economic and social performance of the political regimes, women's rights, indigenous rights, human security and conflict resolution, and U.S. human rights policy in the region. We will discuss questions such as: What is the nature of human rights abuses in Latin America? What is the status of democracy in region? Who is in/ who is marginalized in Latin American democracies today? What is the role of national and international NGOs in democratization and human rights promotion? What are the best policies to promote democracy and human rights in Latin America today? The course objectives are the following: i) to understand the key historical, political, and normative debates about democracy and human rights; ii) to provide analytically and practical skills about human rights, particularly on its role in contemporary Latin American politics; and iii) to obtain knowledge of the key political challenges confronting activists, policy-makers and scholars to strengthen the quality of democracy and human rights in Latin America.
Course	IRI 9602 – Brazilian Foreign Policy I (<i>4 credits</i>)

Course Description	The course will explain how the main Brazilian foreign policy paradigms were formulated as well as discuss the role of economic development of the Brazilian foreign policy contents. The following issues will be discussed: the Republican regime and foreign policy; Americanism and Pan-Americanism; Cold War and foreign policy; the impact of economic development on Brazilian foreign policy; the Independent Foreign Policy and the Globalism; the foreign policy of military regime and the Americanism; geopolitics and National Security Doctrine; Globalism revival and consolidation; democracy and foreign policy; the post Cold War and Brazilian international insertion; actors and perceptions of Brazilian foreign policy.

Course	LET 9419 - Special Topics in Portuguese Language. Study and discussion of special topics related to the Portuguese language studies. (4 credits)
Course Description	Intercultural studies: parameters of analysis. Linear system identification: batch and recursive least squares. State estimation: Kalman filter, receding-horizon approaches. Nonlinear system identification: benchmark problems, classical and machine learning based approaches.

Course	Tópicos Especiais (Inglês) FIL 1262
Course Description	This course is designed to immerse students in some of the central debates of contemporary western philosophy. To achieve this goal, we will engage in a critical exploration of such topics as knowledge and certainty, science and method, freedom and determinism, and authority and the state. A student will be expected to be able to articulate the various philosophical problems considered in the course and to assess the various arguments pro and con surrounding the proposed solutions. The course is fundamentally based on reading, discussing and writing about distinct philosophical questions.

Course	SOC 9174- Contemporary Brazilian Debates from a Sociological and Anthropological

	Perspective (4 credits)
Course Description	This course aims to give an introduction to contemporary Brazilian anthropology and sociology. Beginning with central problems which influenced the constitution of these two disciplines, centering around the ideas of Gilberto Freyre and Sergio Buarque de Hollanda, we will discuss modernity and Portuguese tradition; the historical role of the State and its relations with society; public life and private values; family and social solidarity; "racial democracy" and criticisms; Brazilian modernism. The course will then highlight some specific contemporary subject discussions in both areas: violence and urban life, race and inequality, religion, cultural artistic manifestations, especially Tropicalism, Brazilian funk and "manguebeat".
Course	SOC 9175 - Political Sociology in Brazil: A Brief Overview (4 credits)
Course Description	Political Sociology in the 1930s. The agrarian question. Dictatorship, societal authoritarianism and military power. Society, labor sociology and cities. The Constitution of 1988 and the citizenship sphere. Pluralities, identities and social struggles in Brazil. Government, habits and traditions. Brazil and international political sociology.
